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# This Issues Focus

Optometry



The teaching of undergraduate optometry is a new discipline for the university of the Highlands and Islands and the university is delighted to have welcomed the first cohort of students to the BSc(Hons) optometry degree in September 2020.

This innovative new degree utilises problem-based learning, an approach that has been used for many years in medical education but is relatively new to optometry education. That combined with clinical placements across all four years of the programme, aims to ensure that graduates are well prepared for the opportunities and challenges of delivering eyecare particularly in remote and rural settings.

Students and staff will be located within the Centre for Health Science as well as within Moray College UHI, Elgin from 2022, which will house specialised clinical teaching facilities specific to optometry. Whilst the delivery of the new undergraduate degree programme is the current primary focus, in the longer term the department will look to develop research, continuing professional development provision and other opportunities.

## Research and Student Spotlight

Having completed the viva for my PhD in May of 2020, over video conference, I knew it was going to be a challenging time to get employment. Having minor corrections to go through kept me busy over the Summer, whilst concurrently looking



for any jobs that aligned with my research interests. I knew that within the current pandemic, I did not want to relocate too far from where I am based now in Moray. My thoughts around this decision were based upon travel restrictions, lockdowns and also my finances. Moreover, having just completed my PhD, it was quite daunting going into my first full time job for approximately ten years having continually progressed from undergraduate, to Masters and onto the PhD at the University of the Highlands and Islands.

Around six months had passed since my viva and I was beginning to consider work in different industries. A member of staff pointed out to me that a post-doc

position was coming up within the University of the Highlands and Islands and might be of interest to me. The minute I saw the advertisement, I knew the position was perfect for me. Not only did it tick all the boxes for the research I am interested in around the use of digital technology and physical activity to improve aspects of health, it meant that I would be able to get a job without having to relocate.

I have now currently been in the post-doctoral role for six months starting in December 2020.
